Earthquake Musings

One of the goals of the Siuslaw Soil and Water Conservation district is to inform watershed residents of soil and water movement benefits and risks. A local caution that may not have been considered, yet could be a great additional danger to survivors of a west coast PNW subduction zone earthquake, is that in the coastal mountain valleys with unstable soils many landslides will happen! These slides will block many stream systems temporarily. Survivors, (and many could be injured) desperately needing to help each other, will often be displaced out of their homes by extensive damage or fire destruction. They will try to move to a safer place to set up a camp to move everybody too. Sites may be chosen because most level ground is close to streams. The danger is that slides upstream could dam water that would fill the areas behind them and break through. This would mean there would be a domino effect of flood waters washing through many valley bottoms! This danger NEEDS better educational coverage for community risk reduction throughout the Oregon coastal mountains.

Careful selection of pieces of ground that are still suitable helicopter landing sites should be quickly determined, because that would likely be the best chance of quickly helping the injured, and obtaining other necessities, like food and medications. Very obvious signal markings on the ground will be most important to set up, but only at favorable sites to land.

It might be important to remember this type of flood danger!

The Siuslaw Soil and Water Conservation District works with many conservation partners to help all Siuslaw watershed residents increase habitats for us all to survive in.



Session 1: Effective Board Management

- -The typical structure of a nonprofit board, including officer positions and key policies
- -How to incorporate tools for effective collaboration between Board Chair and Executive Director (if you have one!)

Session 2: Governance Plans: A Tool for Board Success and Transitions

This session focuses on exploring the benefits of a Board Governance Plan that clearly communicates the expectations, responsibilities, and protocols for all those involved in the governance function of a nonprofit. A Board Governance Plan is an opportunity for board members to define their culture, agree on how they will work together, set up how they will measure their success, establish a recruitment and orientation process, and calendar the work they need to do over the course of a year. A Board Governance Plan removes the guesswork on how the board functions and creates a plan for the board's work that persists through board leadership changes.
