The

They added Steve Korin on stand up-bass and started playing around the region. A year later Heather Brey joined the trio bringing her masterful fiddle, banjolele, ukulele playing and vocals. Dobro and guitar virtuoso, Jack Wheeler, then joined the band bringing his fiery instrumentals and Chicago blues-style guitar playing. Meadow Rue will take you on a journey across the landscape of American music. They incorporate folk, country, blues, bluegrass, old-time rock 'n' roll, with a grounding in funk and soul, all played on acoustic instruments. This force is evident in business models based on a grow and expand or die principle. There can be growth toward betterment, here meaning beneficial in some way to the earth and humankind. Unfortunately, many of these only have monetary gain as a goal. Destruction is infinitely easier and lazier than construction. Our present concept of success is biased by putting a money value on everything, a definition which does not serve us well now. We both create and consume of the cultural dynamic. Supply creates its own demand and only by supplying a positive contribution will we encourage a demand for quality. Take that responsibility seriously. Quit catering to the demands of commercial enterprise that manufactures "what the public wants"...it's pure propaganda. Our opinions are often borrowed from the ideas of others without much investigation as to their accuracy. Catering to existing demands is an extrinsic motivator. We live in a culture of immediacy. The reduction of our sense of time passing into an apparently conceivable unit creates an illusion that serves to dictate our sense of elapsed time. Consider that each day you are measuring that increment against the finitude of your allotted existence in this scene. A year to me now would be only 1/89 of my time reference. When I was eight, a year was 1/8 of my time reference. No wonder they seem to go by faster and faster. At the rate that big industry is destroying our fragile Earthly environment, our survival as a species is definitely on the line. Everything we do from here on out is heavily weighted on that one factor. The grab it and run paradigm of "I've got mine", often at another's expense, cannot be tolerated. Nothing promotes violence like scarcity. Give back in whatever way you can, even as a way to offset your spiritual malaise.

Deadwood Bathtub Musings

A few New Orleans lifetimes ago, half of my friends worked at a chain hat shop on Royal Street, drawing a curtain for me onto the retro hip kid scene—one of the city's more predictable subcultures. The old-world beauty of New Orleans naturally attracts those appalled by the poor taste of the present day, but I've never found them very interesting. It's one thing to wear another time's outfit, but it's another thing entirely to live its ethos.

Take the way Natalie and Jake bring the 70's back over at Rock Creek. It goes without saying that they have the look. Natural beauties with great tans, Jake wears hippie-artisanal jewelry and a joint behind his ear, and Natalie rolled up at this year's Rock Creek Party at the Community Center wearing her signature pair of bell bottoms so archetypically 70's they should be in the Smithsonian. But they live it even more than they look it. Clothing optional creek time is not so much their preference as their creed, and in choosing the forest way of life they have consciously declined a more conventional path.

Like their Rock Creek predecessors, Jake and Natalie's commitment to their choice meant living rough in the beginning, most notably (to this urban dweller, at least) going without a bathroom for a year while they put together the money and the building plan. Deadwood veterans may take a winter without hot showers or a toilet in stride, but there's no getting through that without a baseline level of grit few among the younger generations possess. I remember how excited I was the summer Brian Hodgson built the bathroom off the side of their yurt, and though it was a simple, weatherproof rectangle, after a year of going without may as well have been the Ritz.

Natalie is a bath person like myself, and we discussed her bath plan with passion. I had spotted a clawfoot somewhere on the premises that I wanted for her desperately, clawfoot evangelical that I am. But Brian Hodgson, who I suspect is not a bath person, was keen on simplicity, and Natalie was keen on having her bathroom finished before the raisin started, and wisely elected to go the simple route. Her bathtub wouldn't be long or ornate, but it would be deep—and hers.

The finished bathroom wears its simplicity well, a reminder that beauty and luxury are easily separable from wealth. It's bright and spacious with a view of the creek, decorated by plants, and natural beauty products with small creative touches everywhere. Taking a bath there is a wonderful thing to do, especially when it takes place in the full fairy light of Natalie's most gracious hospitality. To be clear, the subjects of this column are only those who have offered me bath hospitality. Say something gross happens one day, like I aid in the slaying of a rooster before spending a long hour of gutting and plucking, and Natalie is likely to insist I treat myself to a soak. Sweet Dreams: The 2023 Holly Jolly Follies

Nothing kicks off the holiday season quite like C.R.O.W.'s production of *The Holly Jolly Follies*. This year's *Follies* will be presented at the Florence Events Center December 6, 7, and 8.

Director and playwright Melanie Heard has created an enchanting script entitled "Sweet Dreams: A North Pole Nutcracker." The show is loosely based on the beloved classical ballet's story, but according to Heard is "Not your grandma's Nutcracker!" Heard danced in the traditional Nutcracker for eight years, portraying every role from a dancing Mirliton, to a demi-soloist Waltz of the Flowers dancer, to a party-goer to a soldier chasing rats around. "The Nutcracker is forever a part of my heart," she says. "But this show is quite a spin on the classic favorite."

During a Nutcracker rehearsal, she falls asleep and is whisked away to a magical dream world where she encounters bizarre, mystical, and fantastical creatures. She also meets a handsome Prince who teaches her the power of friendship. Sparkle learns that being present for the little things in life is perhaps one of the most beautiful gifts of all.

This year's Follies will feature associate direction by Genevieve Shahan, musical direction by Maree Beers, plus many other talented volunteers and performers.

As always, there will be delightful variety act style performances, intermixed throughout. These will include the Flight Dance Team, several beautiful vocalists, various aged tappers, hip-hoppers, and belly dancers, C.R.O.W.'s ballet and contemporary dance class performances, a commercial spoof, the Sugarplum Fairy variation, live music, the Dance Moms, and of course....the World Famous Tutu Dads - who will waltz their way across the stage like never-before-seen vivacious blooms.
